

Declinations are subject to approval by the Medical Staff. Failure to submit this information by Sept. 30 will result in your administrative sus-

pension from the Medical Staff, in accordance with the Bylaws. If you are not fully vaccinated, you must complete twice weekly COVID-19 testing and report your results to this link: https://forms.office.com/r/xMGTCvQiw9 AND you are required to wear a surgical mask or higher-level NIOSH-approved respirator anytime you are on the campus. Pick up testing kits free of charge in the Medical Staff Office M-F, 8-5 p.m. to take with you. The Medical Staff Office does not have the ability to read test results on site. Questions? IN MEMORIAM: Winston Ho, MD

With deep sadness we share the passing of St. Joseph hematologist-oncologist Winston Ho, MD.

Born in 1943, Winston was the descendant of Chinese immigrants to British Guiana. He attended Smith Church Congregational School and Queen's College in Georgetown, Guyana. He received a WHO scholarship to



study medicine at Hebrew University's Hadassah Medical School in Israel, where he served in the IDF as a medical officer.

Winston returned to his country of birth to serve at the Public Hospital of Georgetown. He then came to Los Angeles for his internal medicine residency and hematology fellowship at UCLA. Dr. Ho was one of the pioneers of bone marrow transplantation and a main founder of UCLA's Bone Marrow Transplant Program. He also ran the blood bank at UCLA. He had the privilege of training other physicians around the world. Eventually, Dr. Ho moved to the Hematology Oncology Medical Group based at St. Joseph Hospital. He was a dedicated physician and beloved by his peers. He gave back to the underserved of his community whenever he could, and treated many patients at the St. Joseph Hospital Orange La Amistad Clinic.
