Beloved Providence caregiver Patty Hernandez was the victim of domestic violence. Her legacy now lives on through the region's domestic violence toolkit.

Providence funds business toolkit to help address domestic violence crisis in Spokane

In April 2019, beloved Providence caregiver Patty Hernandez was killed by her boyfriend.

Providence invested \$250,000 into the Spokane Regional Domestic Violence Coalition over two years from Providence's Community Benefit Fund so they could create a toolkit for businesses and organizations.

Released in May 2023, the toolkit is a free online resource with written and video lessons. It teaches people how to recognize the signs of domestic violence and provides guidance to managers on starting conversations with employees they're worried about. Additionally, the toolkit offers a workplace policy section for senior leaders or human resources to implement clear policies and provide direction.

A tribute to Patty, her legacy lives on through the toolkit, which can be accessed at EndTheViolenceSpokane.org.

We are committed to working outside our ministry and campus walls to reach deeper into the communities we serve; we proactively and consciously invest in partnerships and programs to improve care and equity for the most vulnerable among us.
