#### **CDPH Lifts Mask Mandate**

Universal masking is no longer required in Providence's California health care settings (with the exception of LA County), per an order by the California Department of Public Health (CDPH). At Providence St. Joseph Hospital masking will continue to be required:

- For caregivers and visitors for patients who are COVID-19 positive or patients under investigation (PUI).
- For caregivers who did not receive their influenza vaccine (until April 30, 2023), per Caregiver Health Services policy.

Anyone (caregivers/visitors) with signs and symptoms of illness should refrain from entering the facility. Caregivers who are COVID-19 positive should stay home and notify your supervisor and Caregiver Health Services through the Call Center at 949-534-4450. If there is a surge of COVID-19 in the community and/or an outbreak in the ministry, masking may be needed based on state, local health department or other regulatory authority guidance.

You may choose to continue wearing a face covering (procedure mask or respirator) based on your personal level of risk or preference. Current Cal/OSHA exposure masking requirements are unchanged. Follow the workflow provided by the Call Center (949-534-4450). Caregivers should comply with Standard and Transmission-based Precautions and use of the appropriate PPE for the task, and continue to perform proper hand hygiene.

#### Kidney Transplant Program Celebrates 50th Anniversary



This year we celebrate the 50th anniversary of our Kidney Transplant Program. Since launching, we have performed more than 1,230 kidney transplants. We recently gathered to celebrate this lifesaving feat with a butterfly display on our lawn, featuring a butterfly for every transplant patient who has had their life transformed at SJO.

With the dedicated work of Yasir Qazi, MD, Robert Naraghi, MD, Ervin Ruzics, MD, and the team of nurses, dietitians, social workers, clinical program assistants and our quality coordinator, we expect to continue to grow and provide life-giving, life-enhancing opportunities to patients. Very soon we'll add pancreas transplants to our program. Simultaneous kidney-and-pancreas transplant can be truly life-changing. Dialysis and insulin therapy are no longer needed and effectively, these patients are no longer diabetic-a transformative moment for our program and our patients.

### New Training Requirements for (DEA)-registered Practitioners

On Dec. 29, 2022, the Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2023 enacted a one-time, eight-hour training requirement for all Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA)-registered practitioners on the treatment and management of patients with opiod or other substance use disorders. All DEA-registered practitioners must satisfy this training requirement.

As of June 27, 2023, practitioners will be required to check a box on their online DEA registration form affirming they have completed the new training requirement. The deadline for satisfying it is the date of a practitioner's next scheduled DEA registration submission.

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
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
